

Teaching Step	Explanation	
Identify	Identify the writing strategy, skill, or technique in literature	
	Cool Tools-Mark or highlight in some way using markers, pencils ,act out the	
	text, puppets	
Teacher Modeling	Teacher writes in front of the group, examples.	
	Cool Tools- thumbs up or down signals, slates for feedback	
Shared Writing	The teacher still holds the pen but students contribute verbally to the	
	discussion.	
	A child may also serve as a volunteer and write in front of the class as the	
	teacher guides him or her.	
	Cool Tools- Same as above	
Guided Writing	Students do the writing with lots of teacher guidance.	
	Teacher leads students whole class or small groups.	
	<i>Cool tools</i> - Strips, post its, adding machine tape, odd sized papers either large	
	or small, index cards, overhead transparencies	
	Guided Writing may occur	
	-during Writer's Workshop	
	-with a temporary group based on need	
	-Guided Writing during guided reading	
Independent Writing	Students write on their own.	
	<i>Cool Tools</i> bookmark or other cool paper with the rubric for the assignment.	
Guided Conferencing	Students work with the teacher in small groups to discuss their independent	
	writing using a rubric created for the writing task.	
	Cool Tools- sticky notes, toy microphone	

# What is Guided Writing? The Missing Middle Piece!

Guided Writing is a bridge between shared writing and independent writing, a scaffold that supports students with helpful tools as they move into writing on their own. Guided writing lessons may occur with the whole class or in small teacher led groups. Students contribute to a group practice piece of writing before writing on their own.

**Blue:** Catchy Beginning **Green:** Topic/ Thesis Statement


**Red:** Main Points **Yellow:** Details
